BODY ARRIVES IN MOUNT VERNON.

Mrs. Custer and E. C. Stedman Visit the Masterton Home.

MOUNT VERNON, N. Y., May 4.—The body of Alexander Masterton, who was killed in New York yesterday by J. Neale Plumb, reached this city this evening at 6 o'clock, over the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

The body was transferred to "Forfor," Mr. Masterton's old home, in Bronxville. The place is named after Mr. Masterton's birthplace, in Scotland. During the evening many of the neighbors called. Among them were Mr. and Mrs. F. R. Chambers, W. H. Lowe, Edmund Clarence Stedman, Mrs. Elizabeth Custer, widow of Gen. Custer, and R. McE. Stuart.

The funeral services will take place at the house on Saturday afternoon and will be private. The Rev. Dr. Webster of the Bronxville Reformed Church will conduct

the services.

SPANISH BOY AS A MASCOT.

Mr. De Fere Brings One of the Vizcaya's Crew from Florida.

Paul E. De Fere, a Brooklyn lawyer, who lives at 1,176 Dean Street, returned yesterday from his wedding trip, during which he was in Florida, and brought with him a souvenir of his travels. The souvenir was a little Spanish boy, Pedro Urizas, who was a cabin boy on Capt. Eulate's cruiser Viz-

caya, sunk off the Cuban coast.

Pedro is fourteen years old. During the sea engagement, when the Vizcaya was destroyed, he was wounded three times in one leg. He was taken with others of the Spanish crews to Portsmouth, N. H., and then brought to New York. He did not wish to return to Spain, and slipped away from his companions. He stowed himself away on a steamer bound for Havana. He then stowed away on the steamship Mascot, which took him to Tampa. He remained there until picked up by Mr. De Fere, who says he intends to keep the boy. Pedro was born in Bilboa, Spain.

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
